A young lady named Tina had been attending the Spot Bay church for a few months. She contacted the Woods and told them that, during the Sunday evening service on May 22—broadcast online—she had given her heart to the Lord.

Dr. Woods later wrote, "We praise the Lord that even in times of adversity God still works on the hearts of people. God is so good."

The Doyles from Papua New Guinea were already home on furlough.

Also, pray for more donors to pledge monthly support to enable their continued ministry.

*Pray for David and Zenia and their boys in Red Bay and Gayle and Micki in Cayman Brac; they face strict curfews as their government tries to prevent rapid spread of the virus. Ask for God's blessing on them as they try to stay in touch with their church people.

There's not a country untouched by the virus. Yet, it remains to be seen what the full effect may be. Pray for wisdom and blessing for our directors and churches.
